can't change. That includes build: Fat, short, heavy, build. You've heard the descriptions. You've heard him described, thin, thin.

Well, what's a distinguishing characteristic that does not change? DNA, skin tone, the darkness of one's skin, light skin, dark skin, black male. When asked, the description between Trevin Smith was his skin tone and Mr. Kirkland's skin tone was major difference, major difference. So that doesn't change.

And if you remember, Calvin and — it was either Calvin or Rodney Ball, and your memory of course controls, says: I'm trying to look at his face and I know he was a black male because the hood was over his face so it was dark. Dark black hood around his face and the face inside the hood was dark. I couldn't see. So dark and darkness of skin is something that witnesses have told you again and again.

A distinguishing characteristic that cannot be changed and has been talked a lot about in this case, eyes. Eyes. The same description of eyes has been threaded throughout this case. And you can complain and you can say: Well, you didn't say red in your statement and you didn't put red in the first police — when the police first talked to you, but when you go through your notes and what witnesses said over and over again was: When I looked at this guy, I noticed his eyes. His eye his were wide. His eyes were wide open.
